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#### **Uniting Parents & Child Care**

Finding child care to fit the needs of a family can be very difficult. At the Child Care Council, we empower families to make a decision on a quality child care option.

Families have access to our free child care education and assistance via phone, our website and the 'Child Care Finder' App. We provide equal opportunity access to resources to assist families in Herkimer, Madison and Oneida County in the process of choosing a child care program based on their individual needs. This



includes education about New York States Child Care Regulations and New York State Office of Children & Family Services records of program compliance, guidance on conducting program visits, questions to ask when interviewing a potential program, information on financial assistance for child care and more.

Our specialists also provide child care program profiles that best meet the family's location and time requirements. These profiles provide parents with detailed information about each program. The Child Care Council does not recommend or endorse any particular child care program. Our goal is to provide the information and resources for a parent or caregiver to make an informed choice in selecting a program that best meets their child's needs.

We encourage families to contact us for additional information as needed to ensure that they have all of the necessary materials to make their decision. Each quarter, we conduct follow up surveys to 20% of our clients to assess the quality of our information and resources and whether our education resulted in increased knowledge.

#### During the 2014 - 2015 Grant Year (Data below represents 220 follow up surveys):

- The Child Care Council provided 923 referrals for 1,161 children in the community.
- 30% of the families were able to find child care from our services.
  - o 19% of those who didn't find care no longer needed care.
  - o 33% of those who didn't find care decided to use a family member or friend.
- 98% would recommend our services to others and use our services again (N=213).
- 97% of those who worked with our specialists found them to be knowledgeable (N=95).
- 96% of those who accessed our resources felt more knowledgeable on choosing child care (N=185).
- 10% indicated that programs did not have openings for their child(ren) to be enrolled.
- 6% indicated that the hours *or* location of care have prevented them from securing care.
- 5% indicated that the cost of care has prohibited them from securing care.
- 4% could not find a program to meet their child(ren)'s medical or health needs.
- 3% indicated that they had found child care through either Care.com or Craigslist.

#### **Continuous Quality Improvement**



Providing licensed or registered child care is so much more than babysitting. One of the commitments of being a regulated child care provider includes the Office of Children and Family Services requirement to obtain 30 hours of professional development in designated topic areas every two years. The Child Care Council supports the early childhood education community by providing frequent opportunities to meet these required hours as well as to improve the quality of care in the Mohawk Valley.

Workshops are offered during a variety of times in locations throughout the tri-county area to better suit the needs of child care programs. Child Care programs participate in our workshops, held throughout the year, as well as our semi-annual professional conferences. The Child Care Council Spring and Fall Conference offer a unique opportunity for participants to receive between 5 and 7 hours of education in one day.

#### During the 2014 - 2015 Grant Year:

- 230 ½ professional development hours were delivered at 46 educational sessions.
  - These sessions were attended by 459 unique participants that represented 129 unique child care programs, caring for approximately 4,132 children in Herkimer, Madison and Oneida County.
- 61% of participants indicated they were overall *Very Satisfied* with the Child Care Council Conferences.

#### **Continuous Quality Improvement**

#### In the 2014-2015 grant year, the Child Care

Council focused on the improvement of quality programming through Technical Assistance Projects. These projects consist of 3 on-site visits by a Child Care Council Educator to provide quality improvement through education, modeling, mentoring and coaching. Pre and post assessments quantify the knowledge gained by the education provided.

The Child Care Council also provides 'Basic Technical Assistance' to child care programs in



the area. This type of assistance is where Child Care Council staff provides education to a child care program without an on-site visit. Some examples of this would be information provided over the phone or resources sent in the mail.

#### During the 2014 - 2015 Grant Year:

- 244 **On-site Quality Improvement Education** provided to 103 programs that affect approximately 4,112 children.
- 178 **Basic Technical Assistance** provided to 141 programs that affect approximately 4,975 children.
- 93% of participants indicated they have implemented what they learned from Child Care Council technical assistance.

#### Impact of the Child Care Council's Quality Improvement

64% of the child care programs<sup>1</sup> in our area have used at least one of our quality improvement resources<sup>\*</sup> in the past grant year. This affects approximately 6,544 children in the community.

45% of the child care programs who use our education services have only used one type of service, 39% have used two types and 16% have used all three.

<sup>1</sup>For the purpose of this report, child care programs who have multiple site locations are counted once for each site location.

\*Quality improvement resources for child care providers include Child Care Council sponsored trainings, on-site intensive technical assistance (including CLASS observations) and basic technical assistance (education and resource-sharing via telephone, email or mail).

#### Child Development Associate Credential Prep

The Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential is the most widely recognized credential in early childhood education in New York and is a key stepping stone on the path of career advancement in the field. The CDA is based on a core set of competency standards, which guide early care professionals as they work toward becoming qualified teachers of young children.

As part of the commitment to improving the quality of child care in the Mohawk Valley, the Child Care Council hosts the CDA Preparatory Class. This series of classes provides the mandatory 120 hours of education in the required topics as well as technical assistance and support.

#### During the 2014 - 2015 Grant Year:

- The Child Care Council worked with 17 unique CDA participants who work for 10 different child care programs to help them toward gaining this credential.
- Participant evaluations indicate a 50% increase in knowledge gained among all participants.

#### **Business Services**

The Child Care Council recognizes the direct impact that child care has on the local economy. Without quality and affordable child care, parents cannot be confident members of the Mohawk Valley workforce. Through ongoing work with the newly-formed Business Leader Work Group, the Child Care Council supports local businesses by helping to ensure their employees have access to child care as well as cultivating quality environments for our future workforce to learn their necessary skills in.

#### During the 2014 - 2015 Grant Year:

- "Ensuring a Ready Workforce in the Mohawk Valley" event drew over 65 representatives of the local business climate.
  - o The Business Leader Work Group formed as a result of this and has met 3 times
    - 'How Child Care Affects Your Bottom Line' presentation for businesses was developed and will be presented by Business Leader Work Group.

#### **Events**

The Child Care Council reaches out to the community through a variety of events throughout the year. **The 'Friends of Children' Recognition Awards Dinner** is an annual ceremony hosted by the Child Care Council to honor notable individuals that make a difference in the lives of children. This event draws a crowd of approximately 200 guests, and this year was made possible with support from Carbone Auto Group, Gary Spaven & Sons, JONA Enterprises, Price Chopper in New Hartford, Representative Richard L. Hanna, Tops in Rome and Water Safari.

The Creative Arts and Education Fair is a free expo for children and families, held in April at Mohawk Valley Community College. The Child Care Council invites community agencies to host booths at the fair where they provide a free activity for children. While children play, the agency can provide parents and caregivers information on their services. This year's fair drew approximately 300 guests. Support from Stewart's Shops provided milk for each child.

Well-attended events such as Townsquare Media's 'Kidabaloo' Expo, The Boilermaker Expo, YMCA Healthy Kids Day and Family-Community Resource Day at the Utica Zoo. increased the public awareness of the Child Care Council. It also allowed us an opportunity to provide resources and make connections to local families.

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
